Some things you should be able to explain or be able to do:

How Frege's sense/reference distinction resolves his two puzzles How Russell's new theory of denoting resolves his three puzzles about referring What Russell's theory of acquaintance is, and why he uses it How to give the informal Russellian logical form of a sentence containing definite descriptions How to understand scope ambiguities involving definite descriptions (according to Russell) How to tell an intensional from an extensional context, and whether an expression is factive What Grice's project is in "Meaning" and how he tries to execute it

(for example, what does he analyze into what, why, and what does it show us?) How to represent, and interpret truth-conditions of sentences using venn diagrams in logical space To identify an author from a characteristic passage we read for class
